

SOROPTIMIST SATURDAY OF SERVICE

Saturday of Service (SOS) is on the first Saturday of March. Every Soroptimist Club in the Soroptimist International of the Americas (SIA) Federation, (which includes North, Central, South America, the Philippines, Korea and Japan) is asked to take on a service project. Each club decides what "hands-on" project it will undertake, within our Mission Statement, to help achieve a goal. Most of those projects are local but often are area-wide, country-wide or international in scope.

In 2003 Golden West Region adopted Soroptimist Saturday of Service as the Region Identifying Project. Over 150 clubs throughout Soroptimist International participated. The date was changed to the first Saturday in March to coincide with International Woman's Day.

In 2004 All four Federations of Soroptimist International participated in SOS. In the Golden West Region 36 of 63 clubs reported they had participated. In the United States of America, 95 clubs participated in 10 of the 15 regions.

2013 GWR--29 clubs participated in SOS. Of the 26 Saturday of Service club projects reported only six SOS events supported the Soroptimist mission. Twelve projects raised funds for another organization, did not support the Soroptimist mission, and did not generate any public awareness attention. Eight projects received public awareness attention but did not support the Soroptimist mission.

NATIONAL WEAR RED DAY Friday, February 3, 2017

Support <u>Go Red for Women</u> by participating in National Wear Red Day on **Friday, February 3** and donate to help fund research during American Heart Month.

In 2003, the American Heart Association and the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute took action against a disease that was claiming the lives of nearly 500,000 American women each year--a disease that women weren't paying attention to. A disease they truly believed, and many still believe to this day, affects more men than women.

Stemming from that action, National Wear Red Day was born. It's held on the first Friday in February every year to raise awareness about heart disease being the No. 1 killer of women. Looking back on all we've accomplished, we've really made tremendous strides. They include:

- Nearly 90% of women have made at least one healthy behavior change.
- More than one-third of women has lost weight.
- More than 50% of women have increased their exercise.
- 6 out of 10 women have changed their diets.
- More than 40% of women have checked their cholesterol levels.
- One third of women has talked with their doctors about developing heart health plans.
- Today, nearly 300 fewer women die from heart disease and stroke each day.
- Death in women has decreased by more than 30 percent over the past 10 years.

But despite our progress, more work is crucial. 1 in 3 women die of heart disease and stroke each year. But what's more powerful? Millions of mothers, sisters, daughters and friends making a change.

Ask any stylist, job coach or dating expert and they'll tell you that red stands out. Eyes are immediately drawn to it. Some even say that the color red is a confidence booster and makes you feel powerful. Maybe that's why we chose the color red to signify our fight against the No. 1 killer in women. Maybe it's just a coincidence that it's also the color of our hearts.

VALENTINE'S DAY

Although the name is Saint Valentine's Day, most people refer to the day as Valentine's Day or even the Feast of Saint Valentine. It was originally a day to celebrate Saint Valentinus, who performed weddings for soldiers who were not allowed to marry. He was imprisoned for this, as well as for ministering to Christians. Saint Valentinus wrote a letter to the daughter of his jailer before he was executed. His letter was signed "from your Valentine." He was buried on February 14. After St. Valentine was buried, Julia, the daughter of his jailor, planted an almond tree with pink blossoms near his grave. The almond tree today is a symbol of lasting friendship and love.

Valentine's Day was not associated with romantic love until the middle ages. By the 1700's in England it began to resemble the Valentine's Day we know today. At this time lovers began to express their love with gifts of flowers, candy and cards, which were called "valentines."
