Dream It, Be It Recap by Pat Box

Soroptimist International of Moreno Valley (SIMV) launched its newest signature program, *Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls* on October 5, 2016, with high school girls in the ASB class at Bayside Community Day School. The program curriculum was developed by Soroptimist International of the Americas, with input from many experts and focus groups around the world, to help girls face and overcome obstacles that challenge having a successful future. Seven 1-hour sessions were held at intervals of once or twice per month. Topics include *Discovering Your Dreams, Exploring Your Careers, Creating Achievable Goals, Rising Above Obstacles, Turning Failure Into Success, Balancing Your Stress,* and *Putting Dreams Into Action.*

Our journey from program inception to delivery was far from simple. In fact, it reminds me of the opening lyrics and title of the 1970 Beatles hit "The Long and Winding Road." Our journey involved months of grant writing preparation, multiple meet-and greet gatherings to gain community and school district support, multiple set-backs, and months of curriculum prep to make it all happen. It also took the contributions of many Soroptimists (6 instructors, 8 assistant facilitators, 12 career mentors), the support of other Soroptimists who served as cheerleaders, and commitments from 7 other professional women in the community to serve as additional career path mentors. Yet when I ask myself, "Was it worth it?" I do not hesitate to respond with a resounding YES. In fact, the joy from the experience still echoes in my mind and heart. It is hard not to be excited when the evaluation results from the 16 participating students were even better than we hoped. Positive improvement was realized in 8 of the 9 evaluation components. The top 3 indicators were:

- 100% of the students stated the feel they have professional role models (a 58% improvement)
- 100 % of the students stated they are able to connect personal values with possible careers (a 42% improvement)
- 100% of the students stated they understand the importance of overcoming setbacks (a 25% improvement)

We certainly had much cause for celebration at our finale wrap-up party on March 15 with the students and Bayside staff. Participants enjoyed a delicious catered Italian buffet; students received certificates of recognition from representatives of the offices of State Senator Roth, State Representative Medina and U.S. Congressman Takano; and Soroptimists presented certificates of participation and goody bags with gifts rich in symbolism. The senior college-bound participants were encouraged to submit an application for the SIMV Rosemary Clayton Memorial Scholarship Award. One student, Dominique Gerald, followed through and submitted an exceptional application and reference letter that showcase her academic achievements, student leadership, community service, and commitment to higher education. She was selected to receive a \$1,000 scholarship with reserve program funds. HOW EXCITING!!

So what comes next? Although we have developed a good foundation to follow, we need to prepare for round two of *Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls* with a new bunch of girls at Bayside when the school year begins in August. We need to expand our Soroptimist Dream It, Be It committee to include 7 instructors (one for each session) and at least 4 more members to serve as assistant facilitators. We need volunteer members willing to share their story in a 3-5 minute class segment during each session about how they overcame setbacks to achieve their goals. Although session dates and times are not yet set, it is likely the classes will be scheduled again on a Wednesday between 11:00-12:15. Will <u>YOU</u> make the commitment to get involved and make a difference?
