

AUGUST 26, 2017 NATIONAL WOMEN'S EQUALITY DAY



The United States Congress passed the 19th Amendment to the Constitution granting women full and equal voting rights on August 26th in 1920. Every year on August 26th, we commemorate this right with National Women's Equality Day.

Seeds were planted for the women's rights movement 80 years before when Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, while in London at the World Anti-Slavery Convention, were denied access to the convention floor. Once back in The United States, along with Martha Wright, Mary Ann McClintock and Jane Hunt, the women set in motion plans for the first woman's rights convention in Seneca Falls, New York. Held at Wesleyan Chapel on July 19-20, 1848, the conference drew 200 women the first day. On the second day, the convention was opened to men and some did attend.

During the convention, 12 resolutions presented. were These resolutions enumerated the rights that women should be equal to men socially, economically, legally representatively. Of the resolutions, all but the 9th were approved unanimously. It was the right to vote that many women felt would cause many of their backers to withdraw their support. However, after much

debate and the support of abolitionist Frederick Douglass, the 9th resolution passed.

Another advocate, Susan B. Anthony, joined Stanton in 1869 in creating the National Woman Suffrage Association (NWSA). Through nearly ten years of persistence and lobbying, NWSA introduced amendment to the Constitution in 1878 giving women the right to vote but after years of debate, the amendment was defeated in Congress in 1886. It would take another 34 years, passing of batons, states the entering union includina constitutions woman's right to vote and civil disobedience for the Amendment to the Constitution to be introduced and finally passed by Congress on August 26, 1920.

HISTORY: By a joint resolution of Congress on August 26, 1971, the first Women's Equality Day was celebrated. Rep. Bella Abzug D-NY) sponsored the resolution and every year since, each president declares this day as Women's Equality Day commemorating the certification of the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution.

Statement:
Access to
Education

Soroptimist International recognizes that access to education for girls and women at all ages is a fundamental human right and is vital for development, economic growth

and poverty reduction. Much progress has been made in improving girls' enrollment in primary schools. However, we still live in a world where many girls and young women face insurmountable barriers completing their education, where educational outcomes for girls and young women are often lacking and where many mature women lack basic skills in reading and writing or access continuing education opportunities. Discrimination, gender stereotypes, economic and time poverty and violence at schools, amongst others, all create environments which keep girls and women from achieving their fullest potential.

Soroptimist International urges governments of all countries to:

- Fulfil existing obligations in international treaties and agreements relating to equal access to education.
- Prioritize quality education for women and girls throughout their lifespan as a necessary foundation for the achievement of all development goals, particularly in relation to the Sustainable Development Goals.
- Uphold international agreements to ensure that girls and women are not at risk of violence, assault or abuse on their way to and from educational facilities, and ensure that domestic policies and justice systems are designed to protect women and girls in educational settings.
- Pledge to work towards policies and programs with a life-course approach to education, recognizing and understanding that access to learning is a human right at all ages, and that women and girls have different learning needs at different times in their lives.

- Work with local partners to improve facilities so that women and girls are afforded education that is accessible, acceptable, available and of good quality.
- Collect sex-disaggregated enrollment, data on retention and completion, as well as sex-disaggregated data educational on outcomes to ensure that women and girls are afforded quality education.

Soroptimist International will continue to:

- Raise awareness specifically about the importance of education for women and girls.
- Provide scholarships and funding for those most in need of primary, secondary and tertiary schooling.
- Create or ensure girl-friendly physical environments in schools, such as proper sanitation facilities, clean water in schools, safe transport to and from school, provision of school supplies and provision of school meals.
- Provide non-formal educational opportunities for girls and young women to assist in the transition from school to work or adulthood.
- Equip young women with the vocational skills and tools necessary to secure stable employment.
- Implement "second chance" programs providing education and training for mature women.
- Train female teachers to achieve gender equity in teaching staff.
- Develop and implement programs which increase

- access to educational opportunities in science, technology, engineering and maths for women and girls and opportunities in traditionally female dominated fields such as nursing and teaching for men and boys.
- Run projects which work to ensure seamless access to formal education for girls and young women, particularly in the face of natural disasters, conflict and forced migration.

Meet Founder and Director Kristi Camplin Helping America's Orphans

Foster youth who age out of the foster care system have higher rates of being undereducated, underemployed and becoming homeless. It is startling that 65% of former foster youth end up homeless and that less than 6% attend college. These teenagers often find themselves instantly on their own with no housing or support from family community. Without mentoring and motivation, most former foster youth find themselves

homeless, pregnant, on drugs or in jail.

Kristi Camplin is the Founder and Director of Inspire Life Skills Training. Twelve years ago, Kristi's then husband was a social worker for the County of Riverside and his caseload consisted primarily of foster children ages 16 to 18. Kristi's husband explained that these children would be out on the streets when they turned 18. With no housing or other support, the chances of these foster youth becoming successful and productive members of society were almost non-existent.

Justice minded Kristi believed the situation for these former foster youth was just not fair and she started the non-profit Inspire Life Skills Training. Inspire began with Kristi and her friends purchasing books for former foster kids who were able to enroll in community college. Kristi quickly learned that these relatively lucky kids were "couch surfing" at friends' homes while they attempted to get an education. Kristi started the housing aspect of Inspire with one home in Riverside to house four youths and a resident assistant. The housing program was designed to mimic a college dormitory environment.

According to Kristi, the Inspire program is constantly evolving based upon the needs of the youth in the program. The youth in the program are required to seek some form of secondary education, whether college or a trade school, and are required to have a part-time job. program teaches life skills such as developing a budget and writing a resume. Volunteer mentors assist in guiding the youth in the program. For most of the Inspire youth, these mentors represent the first time that someone cared for them without being paid by the County to do so.

Inspire now has 6 houses in Riverside and San Bernardino County. In the 12 years since Kristi started Inspire, over 150 former foster youth have participated in the program. Of those 150, 93% attended college and 82% gained employment while in the program. Many youth have completed degrees or vocational programs with the assistance of Inspire.

In 2016, Soroptimist International of Riverside adopted the Inspire house on Luther in the City of Riverside, donating everyday items, gifts and home cooked meals. The young women in the house are always in need of food, paper products and personal hygiene items, as well as words of support and encouragement.

In order to accomplish this goal, organization administers several international programs. Soroptimist members belong to local clubs, which determine the focus of volunteer work to their communities and their participation in region, federation and international programs and projects.

Why We Focus on Women and Girls

It's true that both men and women live in poverty, face discrimination and must overcome obstacles. But throughout history, in every country in the world, women and girls face additional obstacles and discrimination solely because of their gender.

Consider the following:

- One in three women have been beaten, coerced into sex or otherwise abused in their lifetime.
- According to a recent report, of the 600,000 to 800,000 people trafficked across international borders annually, 80 percent are female.
- Women work two-thirds of the world's working hours but earn only 10 percent of the world's income and own less than 1 percent of the world's property.
- Two-thirds of the 880 million illiterate adults are women.
- Of the more than 110 million children not in school, approximately 60 percent are girls.






