### LOOKING AHEAD TO OUR NEW YEAR!

For two years, I have been relentlessly researching the best vessel to help the homeless women in the Coachella Valley. Discussions at our May 15 board and May 17 business meetings, and again at our Retreat, showed that there is a good deal of interest in working with the Coachella Valley Rescue Mission this year as part of our handson service program. The members voted at our May 17 business meeting to launch this program with a budget of \$140 monthly. We have a great opportunity to hear from their project director at our first program meeting on September 6 at our new location at the PD Chamber of Commerce. Sometimes it just takes patience to discover where the true need is.

cVRM statistics for 2015 (2016 will be available later this year) showed 135 people completed their New Life and Gateway programs. We are very excited to launch our new service project embracing the homeless women participating in the New Life Program at the Coachella Valley Rescue Mission. The following article was published in the Desert Sun.

Abeatrice Jones did not expect to be homeless. "I'm 66 years old. This was not in my plan," she said. The former schoolteacher, who has Master's degrees in education and divinity, found herself out of a job and a place to live in Orange County. Jones cycled through different shelters until she found the Coachella Valley Rescue Mission last year.

"I came here broken, depressed, sad and frustrated," she said Thursday. "I was feeling suicidal, I wasn't eating, I wasn't sleeping, and I was shutting down." But Jones found comfort in prayer and entered the New Life Program, a year-long, (non-denominational) faith-based rehabilitation program. "If it wasn't for the mission and all that they have supplied for me here, I would have died out there on the street of a broken heart," Jones said.

She graduated from the women's New Life Program Thursday along with other men and women who have successfully completed either the New Life or Gateway Programs. The Gateway Program is a secular rehabilitation that can also last up to a year.
